

While there are many important resources on racism and anti-

racism in the U.S., and/or on the state of the food system, their key filter for inclusion in the bibliography is a link between structural racism and one or more aspects of the U.S. food system. The following citations will be accepted for review:

* Peer-reviewed journal articles, and peer-critiqued articles,

* Other scholarly or substantive information produced outside

traditional commercial publishing and distribution channels (e.g.

theses and dissertations, technical reports, working papers, evaluation reports, conference proceedings, publications from NGOs, INGOs, think tanks and policy institutes, patent, and preprints) * Video resources including documentaries, motion pictures, television series, TED Talks and interviews * Recordings of webinars

They will not be including blogs, newspaper articles, tweets, podcasts, etc., because of the sheer volume of these resources. Once a suggestion is submitted there will be a simple vetting

process to determine the fit of submission; please note that not all

submissions may be included in the eighth edition. They hope to

publish the eighth edition by mid-January 2021. They would like as many suggestions as possible. Please share this request widely on listservs and with colleagues and friends who may have additional resources to include!


